## HELPING CHILDREN GRIEVE

We hope children don't experience the death of a loved one; unfortunately, some children suffer the loss of a classmate, friend or family member. Many adults underestimate the abilities of young children to understand what death is. How much children understand depends on their age, life experiences and personality. Like adults, children can take months to process grief. Help children you know grieve with these tips.

1. **Explain death simply and concretely.** It may help to relate death to the body, such as "When Suzy is dead her body stops working. She doesn't sleep, get cold or hungry or scared."
2. **Avoid euphemisms.** Children think very literally, so telling them that a loved one "went to sleep" or is "lost" may confuse them or make them fearful to sleep.
3. **Answer repetitive questions** calmly and with patience. We know children learn by repetition. As they would ask a bedtime story be re-read, they may repeatedly ask questions about death. Don't lose patience with them or discourage them.
4. **Reassure scared children.** After a death, children may fear the death of others close to them. A child may be possessive over remaining loved ones. Others may withdraw from loved ones, fearing their 'disappearance.'
5. **Allow children to play.** As children learn through play, they often grieve through play as well. A child may be drawn to a new toy after experiencing a loss. Allow the child the time she needs to grieve in her own way through play. Check out these homemade [playdough](#) recipes.
6. **Don't hide your pain.** Letting a child see your reaction to a death shows that crying is a natural reaction to emotional pain and loss and can make them more comfortable sharing their feelings.
7. **Respond to the child's lead.** Sometimes we want to explain things or provide information based on our own needs or assumptions about what we think a child wants or needs to know. That can result in confusion or distress for a small child.


Caregivers can't always shield kids from sadness and losses, but helping them learn to cope builds emotional resources they can rely on throughout life.

## Spotlight on SC Voucher

The SC Voucher Program (formerly ABC Voucher) makes payments to child care providers to care for children from low-income families so their parents can work or attend school or training. Approximately 2,000 child care providers are currently enrolled in SC Voucher. SC Voucher pays providers quickly, often 3-4 days after the provider submits forms online. Some parents are required to share in the cost of child care with co-payments. SC Voucher providers can access grants and other supports available through ABC Quality.

## Product Recalls Related to Child Care

- ◇ **Rainbow Play Plastic yellow trapeze rings** due to risk of fall caused by breakage
- ◇ **Fisher-Price Infant cradle swing** due to fall hazard caused by seat peg not being fully engaged
- ◇ **IKEA Children's bat cape** due to strangulation hazard
- ◇ **Flying Tiger Copenhagen Wooden toys** due to choking hazard caused by small parts
- ◇ **Miniland Educational Moogy plush toys** due to choking hazard caused by red button
- ◇ **Munchkin Latch lightweight pacifier** due to clip cover detaching
- ◇ **Pacific Cycle Infant bike helmets** due to choking hazard caused by magnets on the chinstrap
- ◇ **Bednest Bedside infant sleepers** due to fall hazard and failure to meet federal standards
